

UGMC ACHIEVES MORE MILESTONES: 11 KIDNEY TRANSPLANTS

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EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

UGMC - PENN STATE HEALTH ORGANISE BOOT CAMP ON THE HEAD AND NECK SURGERIES

The Centre collaborated with Penn State Health (USA) from the 30th August to 6th September, 2024 to host the Otolaryngology Boot Camp, which empowered over 50 ENT surgeons and residents with essential skills needed for successful clinical management and professional development.

Based loosely on the concept of military boot camps, students actively participated in various exercises and simulations in order to develop their competence in relevant psychomotor, cognitive and affective skills. The programme enhanced surgical skills and collaboration among healthcare professionals from leading hospitals like UGMC, Korle Bu and Greater Accra Regional Hospital.





TRAINING ON MANAGING OBSTETRICS EMERGENCIES HELD AT UGMC

UGMC in collaboration with UK-based TRIO Bridge Foundation, conducted a two-day Multi-professional Obstetrics Simulation Emergency Training (MOSET) at the Centre's Medical Training and Simulation Centre from 30th September to 1st October, 2024. Through a combination of theoretical engagement and live clinical simulations, the training sessions reinforced the importance of Continuous Electronic Fetal Monitoring (CEFM), Neonatal Life Support (NLS), and standardized theatre protocols to ensure patient safety and improve outcomes. These annual training sessions which commenced in 2022 is focused on addressing critical gaps identified by both teams during previous sessions.

At the end of the 2024 training session, UGMC and the TRIO Bridge Foundation reaffirmed their commitment to a long-term partnership, including the development of a sustainable training ecosystem.

Key initiatives agreed upon include the implementation of a "train the trainer" model, creation of accessible eLearning modules, and the enhancement of the Medical Training and Simulation Centre to support ongoing professional development for staff of the Obstetrics and Gynaecology Department of the Centre.

HEALING YOUNG HEARTS THROUGH PARTNERSHIPS



In partnership with Qatar Charity, the Centre provided free paediatric heart surgeries for 41 children diagnosed with congenital heart conditions in August 2024. These life-changing surgeries, conducted with our state-of-the-art equipment, gave young patients a chance to lead healthier lives.

This initiative brought together expert medical teams and with the aid of advanced technology to ensure successful outcomes. The impact of these surgeries extended beyond the patients themselves, bringing immense relief and joy to their families, while reinforcing our commitment to equity in the provision of world-class healthcare.

PINK OCTOBER: 50 WOMEN SCREENED



On 6th and 19th October, 2024our Public Health and Public Relations Department in collaboration with Adorn Jewellery Co. Ltd. organised a free breast cancer screening event at Parks and Gardens in commemoration of the Breast Cancer Awareness month (Pink October). Fifty women were screened and educated about the signs and symptoms of the Disease and the need for regular screening of the breasts.

UGMC- FLOKEFAMA INAUGURATE OF STATE-OF-THE-ART M680 IMMUNOCHEMISTRY ANALYZER

In partnership with Flokefama Company Limited, proudly installed a state-of-the-art integrated M680 Integrated chemistry and immunoassay analyzer at the Centre. The Mindray equipment brand, which is the only one of its kind in West Africa and the third in Africa, is meant to assist in the diagnosis of thyroid disorders, infectious diseases, infertility, tumours, and bone diseases amongst others.



FIGHTING ANTIMICROBIAL RESISTANCE (AMR)

Our antimicrobial stewardship committee partnered with Denk Pharmaceuticals to observe the 2024 Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) Awareness Week. This collaborative initiative which took place from 18th to 24th of November, 2024 was aimed at educating the public about the dangers of antimicrobial abuse and promote their responsible use.

Key activities during the week included engaging in community outreach programs, which provided valuable information on preventing AMR, a pledge wall where participants committed to using antibiotics responsibly, and a grand durbar that was held at the MTSC auditorium. These events served as platforms to highlight the devastating impact of antibiotic misuse and overuse to the public. Through this partnership, UGMC reaffirmed its commitment to global health priorities by promoting awareness and inspiring action to address this critical public health challenge.

The Centre proudly announced the successful completion of 8 more kidney transplants in 2024, a groundbreaking achievement in the advancement of specialized healthcare within the sub-region. Under the leadership of **Dr. Emmanuel Attua Asante** and other highly skilled local and international medical team members, this milestone exemplifies UGMC's commitment to our mission to Inspire Hope and Promote Health to patients and their families across the subregion.

The accomplishments included three (3) transplants which were performed earlier in the year and an additional five completed in December 2024. This brings the total number of kidney transplants to eleven (11) since the first set of transplants were done in 2023. Congratulations to the entire team for their remarkable dedication, sacrifice and expertise!

MR. SELASI SETSOAFIA Deputy Director, Facilities Management, UGMC

Q: Can you tell us a bit about yourself and your journey to becoming the Head of Facilities Management at UGMC

•Coordinating energy conservation measures with respective departments and through automation

•Coordination of annual reports, workplans, budgets and other reports by the various departmental heads in the Directorate

•Planning for capital development projects and supervising construction and renovation works in the facility Q: How does your team ensure that UGMC maintains world-class healthcare infrastructure and services?

A: With a commitment to excellence and a proactive approach, my team and I ensure that our workplace remains safe, efficient, and welcoming for both our team and clients through:

•Maximizing the efficiency of equipment, plant and estates by planned preventive maintenance.

•Purchasing Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) replacement parts for corrective maintenance activities to ensure a prolonged useful life of equipment

•Engaging outsourced maintenance service providers as needed and monitoring their performance

•Responding to changing needs of the clinical practice in UGMC by providing additional service points and functional areas to facilitate service delivery

Lobbying for additional staff in the Directorate to ensure that we can provide effective 24-hour coverage provision

•Utilizing BIM software to monitor HVAC to provide physical and psychological comfort and adopting green practices to conserve energy throughout our facilities. Q: What are some projects or initiatives you are particularly proud of in your time at UGMC?

A: As a Directorate, we have been involved in several initiatives, including:

•The creation of more laboratory, pharmacy and payment service points to improve client experience.

•The ongoing construction of the Clinical Trials Unit project

•Provision of technical expertise in the planning stage for several capital development projects that will be undertaken in the medium to long term

•Building good relationships with outsourced service providers to ensure service delivery without interruption

·HVAC systems monitoring to facilitate management of utility bills

•Progressively phasing out the existing Compact Fluorescent Light (CFL) tubes with Light Emitting Diode (LED) tubes to ensure sustainability and energy conservation.

Q: What are the biggest challenges in managing a facility as large and complex as UGMC?

- A: Challenges Managed:
- · Ensuring 24-hour service delivery with inadequate staff numbers
- · Reducing power consumption and energy demand
- · Expanding or providing additional service areas whilst hospital activities are ongoing
- · Lack of available OEM replacement parts for plant and equipment in the country
- · Maintaining the same standard of janitorial excellence across the entire facility
- \cdot Reluctant support and non-compliance from some hospital staff in implementing energy conservation measures

• Effective management and monitoring of different categories of waste from the point of generation in the facility through to the final disposal points

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Q: What plans do you have to ensure the facility looks good a decade from now?

A: I envision UGMC as a benchmark for facility management excellence a decade from now and we will attain that through

 \cdot Building the capacity and upgrading the skillset of the technical team

 Integrating Internet of Things (IoT) technology with Computerized Maintenance Management System (CMMS) to aid in efficient planned preventive maintenance, enhanced predictive maintenance, and energy conservation

 Constructing new buildings dedicated to specific disciplines to reduce the pressure on the existing ones

Incorporating solar power as a primary source of electricity to manage rising utility costs

 Exploring placement arrangements with OEMs and authorised equipment dealers for the replacement of End-Of-Service-Life (EOSL) equipment

 Improvement in the stocking of critical spare parts in conjunction with Procurement and Finance Q: How do you unwind after a demanding day of ensuring UGMC operates seamlessly?

A: Mostly spending quality time with my wife and daughter, and depending on the time of the season, watching a live Real Madrid match with them. I also catch up with my extended family and close friends frequently. I try to find time to read up on architectural design and other personal and professional development material during weekends.

RESEARCH GRANTS

UGMC MSRC receives First Grant from Wellcome Trust!

The UGMC Medical and Scientific Research Centre (MSRC) successfully secured their first grant of £580,785 from the Wellcome Trust! The award title is Validating myo-inositol, a novel renal biomarker for kidney disease and the key project person is Dr. Catherine Laaripuoh Omosule. This grant will support groundbreaking research aimed at validating myo-inositol as a novel biomarker for kidney disease, which has the potential to transform diagnostic approaches and improve patient outcomes.

UGMC MSRC Receives NIH Grant to Advance HIV Research in Ghana

The Medical and Scientific Research Centre of the University of Ghana Medical Centre (UGMC) has secured a prestigious research grant of \$153,912 from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) to support a groundbreaking study titled "Pharmacokinetics and Pharmacogenomics of Dolutegravir-Based Antiretroviral Therapy in Young People Living with HIV in Ghana (PHARMA-YOUNG-HIV)." The key project person is Dr. Nicholas Ekow Thomford

The project aims to explore how young people living with HIV in Ghana respond to Dolutegravir-based treatments, focusing on the genetic and pharmacological factors that influence drug effectiveness.

Pfizer Awarded UGMC a Grant for Antimicrobial Stewardship Training Initiative

The University of Ghana Medical Centre (UGMC) is proud to announce that Professor George Boateng Kyei, a leading infectious diseases expert and Chair of the UGMC Antimicrobial Stewardship Committee, has been awarded an educational grant of USD 20,000 from Pfizer. This grant is for the funding for a vital two-day workshop focused on advancing antimicrobial stewardship among healthcare professionals in Ghana.

The training which took place from 24th -25th October, 2024, targeted 50 participants, including doctors, pharmacists, and microbiologists from UGMC and Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital. The programme aims to address critical gaps in the rational use of antibiotics, with an emphasis on high-risk departments like intensive care, emergency, and internal medicine.

Pfizer Awarded UGMC a Quality Improvement Grant for Breast Cancer Care.

The MSRC has also received a grant of USD 80,000 for a project on "Improving breast cancer treatment adherence through knowledge and psychological support" to commence on 1st January, 2025. The key project personnels are Dr. Susan Siabi, Mr. Raymond Kwesi Matey and Dr. Paul Kumi

UGMC MSRC and Washington University partner on HIV Cure Research Training Programme.

The MSRC is also collaborating with Washington University in St. Louis, funded by a subaward from the Fogarty International Centre. This initiative, titled "HIV Basic Science and Cure Research Training for Scientists at the University of Ghana (H-Cure-RT)," aims to empower the next generation of Ghanaian researchers in HIV basic science and cure research.

With a total funding allocation of \$681,430 over the project's duration, \$138,424 has been granted for the first phase, running from 1st April, 2024, to December 31, 2024. The key project personnel are Dr. Evelyn Yayra Bonney, and Prof. George Boateng Kyei .The programme will focus on developing advanced research skills among scientists, graduate students, and postdoctoral fellows at UGMC and other departments within the University of Ghana.



THE DIFFERENCES BETWEEN PROCUREMENT AND PURCHASING: A PROFESSIONAL OVERVIEW

Purchase Request: This step involves a simple request to preferred suppliers, allowing for quick order placement. A purchase requisition details the needs, receives necessary approvals and is transformed into a purchase order that contains line items and supplierspecific details. **Supplier Communication:** Upon receiving the purchase order, the supplier acknowledges it and provides tracking information to keep the business updated on the status of the order.

Receiving the Order: This stage occurs when the supplier delivers the goods or services, and an official delivery receipt is issued. Store personnel document this receipt, as organisations typically have a protocol for receiving orders that includes verification to ensure the order matches what was delivered.

Receiving Invoice: Once the delivery is made, the supplier sends an invoice for the delivered items. This invoice is typically routed to accounts payable for verification and to ensure it matches the original purchase order.

Payment: The payment step is generally straightforward, involving the payment of the invoice. However, it is essential to implement verification processes like three-way matching to ensure alignment between the receipt, the invoice, and the purchase order.

In summary, purchasing includes several key steps: submitting a purchase request, communicating with suppliers, receiving orders, handling invoices, and making payments. Now that we have grasped the concept of purchasing, let us delve into what procurement is all about.

Procurement is a holistic and strategic approach to acquiring goods or services that fulfil a business's objectives in an organised and cost-efficient manner. Unlike purchasing, which is more transactional, procurement involves a series of processes, including supply chain management practices such as sourcing, negotiating contracts, establishing delivery timelines, and quality control. The overarching goals of procurement are to achieve cost reductions, exercise control over spending, and enhance workflow efficiency While purchasing decisions may focus on straightforward factors like price, delivery, and convenience. Procurement decisions are guided by strategic plans that take into account the total cost of ownership and various internal requirements.

Let's explore the following aspects related to procurement:

Business Ethics: Consumers expect businesses to adhere to certain ethical standards. Quality: Quality is paramount in procurement strategies and decisions. Identifying the best quality at the right price is essential for making informed procurement choices.

Supplier Capability: The Procurement Department ensures that suppliers can consistently deliver the required quantities on time. Strategic sourcing involves considering supplier reliability, as unexpected challenges such as temporary setbacks, natural disasters, or business failures can affect preferred suppliers' ability to deliver.

Vendor Relationships: Procurement focuses on maintaining strong relationships with vendors to capitalize on special offers, such as preferred pricing and early payment discounts. A robust relationship with vendors also increases the likelihood of their flexibility in meeting urgent requirements.

Cost: The price of raw materials is a critical issue for businesses. Typically, a procurement team employs a tendering or competitive bidding process to acquire goods and services. Bids are evaluated based on established criteria. and ultimately. the most economically responsive tenderer is selected. This decision is not based on price alone, as other factors are also considered.

Negotiation: Procurement enhances negotiation power consolidating by spending across all departments. A skilled procurement manager can negotiate business better deals by leveraging bulk pricing and more favourable payment terms.

Spend Control: Effective procurement strategies identify spending categories and set protocols for purchasing within those categories. Strict control measures help eliminate maverick spending and unauthorised acquisitions.

Risk Mitigation: Systematic identification, assessment, and strategies to minimize risk are crucial for procurement success. Managing risk is integral to effective procurement management, particularly in a diverse business environment.

Establishing Protocols: The procurement function establishes governing rules for automated procurement processes, which facilitate quick ordering for routine purchases. This approach eliminates bottlenecks by clearly defining the steps required for acquiring goods and services that need approval.

Payment: The payment process represents the final step in the procurement management framework. It involves settling invoices submitted by vendors after the delivery of goods that meet specified criteria.

In conclusion, procurement is not merely about purchasing; it represents a holistic framework of strategies and protocols meticulously crafted to maximise value throughout the procurement cycle. By strategically managing these diverse components, procurement plays a vital role in enabling organisations to achieve their long-term business objectives. 
